

PASTORAL LETTER I

'Life in Faith'

Dear Fathers, Brothers, Sisters and my dear people,

Thy Kingdom Come!

The Primary responsibility of a Christian is to grow in faith, thus achieve/attain Christian maturity. For which one should make great strides 'to be rooted in Christ' (Col.2:17) on daily basis. Our life is building up Christ - our saviour - in us, through us and with us. Christ is the source, inspiration, and target in life. Chisto-centrism is foundational to growth in Christian maturity. The basics to these are the word of God, the sacraments and the prayer, besides charity or acts of mercy. It is with this view in mind that we have been observing different years with special intentions and specific dedications.

In the year 2015-16 we observed the Year of Mercy - it was a global event. The Year of Family Prayer - *Parivarik Prarthana Varsh* was observed in the following year (2017). Then we switched over to the Year of Adoration - *Aaradhana Varsh* (2018). Now we are in the Year of Bible reading - *Bible Vaachan Varsh* (2019). The next year (2020) will be the Year of Proclamation - *Susamachar Ghoshna Varsh*. It will be meaningful, if we can declare the year 2021 as the Year of Divine Life. These observations/celebrations will be a great preparation for the diamond jubilee of our diocese - completing sixty years. What matters is not celebrations but transformation in to a genuine men and women of Christian life. One should be able to proclaim "it is not I but Christ who lives in me" (Gal 2:20) - to be another Christ, *Alter Christus*. It is our goal and it is our hope.

The Year of Mercy (2015-16) reminded us of our great responsibility to steward our fellow brethren - to love one another as Jesus has loved us (Jn. 13:34). A concern to the poor and the needy is and should be the characteristic trait of Christian identity (Mt. 5:3). Likewise, the *Daya Varsh* (The Year of Mercy) has revamped our

There is also half-day daily adoration held in Sanjeevani Ashram, Wardha, run by SJB Sisters. I hope the Bible Vachan Varsh inspire us to be men and women of love, truth, justice and peace - the kingdom values. The year follows (2020) is going to be an year of sharing the kingdom values to others - the proclamation of good news -Susamachar Goshana Varsh. It is our mission and ministry - for that matter of any baptized Christian (Mt. 28:19-20, 1 Cor. 9:16). Let us resolved to be more and more convinced of our mission.

evangelist Mark lucidly articulates the "why" of 'calling the disciples': "And he ordained twelve, that they should be with him, and that he might send them forth to preach, and to have power to heal sicknesses, and to cast out devils" (Mk.3:14-15). Jesus called the disciples to be with him" and "to be sent out to proclaim (teach) the good news".

The credential of a teacher is his/her degrees. The degree documents certify him/her to teach. But, it is the appointment letter that 'enables'/empowers one to teach. We the missionaries are 'enabled' and 'empowered'- appointed - to teach (Mt. 28:19-20, Mk. 16:15, Jn. 20:21, Acts 1:8). How do we teach/preach - by telling, explaining, demonstrating or inspiring? Often it is pointed out that today what lacks' is role models. Do all 'role models' inspires? Let us reflect, No doubt they serve a great lot. What else more required? The knowledge that we acquire by our formation assists us to become teachers/preachers. The 'experience' from childhood too serve in forming teachers/preachers in us. But as missionaries we become genuine teachers/preachers by divine touch - the experience of divine wisdom by being with God. Touch and taste how good is the Lord (Ps. 34:8). Being missionaries we are not social workers doing a spiritual ministry but spiritual persons doing social apostolate. The question is, what is my priority in personal commitment to the mission entrusted to me. Am I genuinely a man/woman of God, man/woman of prayer and a man/woman of divine experience? My prayer life, spiritual exercises and commitment to ministry - a show or out of conviction borne of commitment to Christ?

The invitation Christ extended to the disciples 'then and even today' is "to be with him" and "to send out to proclaim (teach)". When, "to be with him" lacks in a missionary he/she becomes a teacher who 'tells' who "explains" and who "demonstrates". They need not necessarily "inspire". A missionary is called to be inspiring icons of God's Kingdom values where social apostolate community building, Education ministry or service to the sick become channels of divine experience both for the missionary and

for the beneficiaries. A genuine missionary is a channel of God's love and presence of divine experience amidst people (Cf. Jn. 4:42). We have to examine and see 'what are we' and what do people feel / experience with us!

Paul in Gal.2:20 exclaims: "it is not I but Christ who lives in me". Paul really means when he proclaims "we have become fragrance of Christ Jesus in God" (2Cor 2:15). Jesus categorically instructed his disciples "by your love, they will know, that you are my disciples (Jn.13:35). So, to be with Jesus sincerely has inspiring strength and empowering valour: Sincerity, Simplicity, Sensitivity, Humility and Chastity are ingredients of missionary character that transform us to be 'inspiring' in our missionary endeavours. God bless you all.

A Tribute to SR. IVES CMC (1945 -2019)



Appolonia (Sr. Ives) was born on 22nd July 1945 as the 7th of the 11 children of Joseph and Rosa. She hails from Paliekara family in the parish of Chiyyaram, blessed with the sweet fragrance of holiness spread by the Rose of Carmel, St. Euphrasia. Appolonia did her school education in St. Mary's Convent School, Ollur, Aspiring to commit her life to the Lord, she joined Holy Trinity Convent, Kolazhy, Thrissur in 1963. She took the name Sr. Ives at the time of

her first profession on 5th May 1965. With a great desire to offer herself for her Lord, she made her final profession on 30th April 1969.

The first ten years after her first profession, she was in the field of education. In 1966 when the congregation celebrated the centenary of the foundation, Sr. Ives started her life as missionary. She was one of the pioneers who set out to the unknown villages, to live among them and to bring them up to the main stream of the society. She served in different convents in 8 dioceses in and outside India, such as Indore, Jabalpur, Nagpur, Chanda, Somalia in Africa, Kalyan, Adilabad and Irinjalakuda.

She was blessed enough to celebrate her golden jubilee on the occasion of the sesquicentennial jubilee of our congregation. Simple life and simplicity constituted her hall-mark. During the last phase of her life, she used to spend long hours before the Eucharistic presence, adoring Him and making supplications for the whole world.

Sr. Ives was very keen to be ever submissive to the will of God, revealed through the superiors and through her life situations. A zealous, vibrant, jovial missionary - Sr. Ives, was an exemplar for everyone to live for the poor, with the poor and among the poor. She never had the words IDLENESS and TIREDNESS in her personal dictionary of life. She walked without stop, worked without stop and talked without stop; taking herself the nickname 'nonstop'.

profession. Since 2004 she has been working here. Being a Medical Officer of the Leprosy Control Work (DFIT), she used to visit the villages and conduct medical camps on a regular basis in the Naxal-hit interior villages of Gadchiroli dist.

She was a zealous and courageous to speak to the patients and other people about Jesus and tell them about the healing power of Jesus. She had a very powerful healing hand. Thousands of patients affected with cerebral malaria- brought in unconscious or disoriented state used to recover not only by her medicines but by her ardent prayers. Soon after duty she used to go the chapel and not to take rest. All the 365 days of the year she would be the 1st person in the chapel from 4 a.m. or even before, whether she went to bed late or sick she never missed it. So strong was her commitment to prayer and communion with Jesus. She was the only doctor in Sevasadan till the year 2013. Sr. Marina herself was not a healthy person; she had hydrocortisone deficiency since several years, diabetics etc and was on medication. Still she never failed to fulfill her ministry. In 2010 she had a fall and broke her hip, and hip replacement surgery was done. After the rest she resumed her duty.

In last October she went for a retreat in Divine Vachan Ashram Balharsha and had a fall in the chapel. She was brought to Nagpur for treatment. After few months when she could walk a little with support, she was taken back to Sevasadan convent again. After a month she had another fall in the room and was in bed for the last 2 months. She had great desire to walk and serve the sick for few more years. But God's will was something else. On 5th June morning she was found quite weak with high fever and too weak to travel. Seeing her condition anointing of the sick was given and soon transported her to Christ hospital and admitted in the ICU. She was diagnosed to have multiorgan failure with great variations in the ECG. Rev. Fr. Joshy Chettianchira the administrator and other staff took great interest and gave maximum care for her. She was restless and struggling. She was in a critical stage. On 7th June the First Friday of the month she rested herself in the Sacred Heart of Jesus in eternal and everlasting peace.

Let the life of Sr. Marina continue to inspire us so that we too may live her values; be zealous missionaries true to our vocation.

MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS FOR THE 53rd WORLD COMMUNICATIONS DAY

"We are members one of another" (*Eph* 4:25). From *social network communities* to the human community

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

Ever since the internet first became available, the Church has always sought to promote its use in the service of the encounter between persons, and of solidarity among all. With this *Message* I would like to invite you once again to reflect on the foundation and importance of our being-in-relation and to rediscover, in the vast array of challenges of the current communications context, the desire of the human person who does not want to be left isolated and alone.

The metaphors of the net and community

Today's media environment is so pervasive as to be indistinguishable from the sphere of everyday life. The Net is a resource of our time. It is a source of knowledge and relationships that were once unthinkable. However, in terms of the profound transformations technology has brought to bear on the process of production, distribution and use of content, many experts also highlight the risks that threaten the search for, and sharing of, authentic information on a global scale. If the Internet represents an extraordinary possibility of access to knowledge, it is also true that it has proven to be one of the areas most exposed to disinformation and to the conscious and targeted distortion of facts and interpersonal relationships, which are often used to discredit.

We need to recognize how social networks, on the one hand, help us to better connect, rediscover, and assist one another, but on the other, lend themselves to the manipulation of personal data, aimed at obtaining political or economic advantages, without due respect for the person and his or her rights. Statistics show that among young people one in four is involved in episodes of *cyberbullying*.

In this complex scenario, it may be useful to reflect again on the metaphor of the *net*, which was the basis of the Internet to begin with, to rediscover its positive potential. The image of the net invites us to reflect on the multiplicity of lines and intersections that ensure its stability in the absence of a centre, a hierarchical structure, a form of vertical organization. The net works because all its elements share responsibility.

From an anthropological point of view, the metaphor of the net recalls another meaningful image: the *community*. A community is that much stronger if it is cohesive and supportive, if it is animated by feelings of trust, and pursues common objectives. The community as a network of solidarity requires mutual listening and dialogue, based on the responsible use of language.

Everyone can see how, in the present scenario, *social* network communities are not automatically synonymous with community. In the best cases, these virtual communities are able to demonstrate cohesion and solidarity, but often they remain simply groups of individuals who recognize one another through common interests or concerns characterized by weak bonds. Moreover, in the social web identity is too often based on opposition to the other, the person outside the group: we define ourselves starting with what divides us rather than with what unites us, giving rise to suspicion and to the venting of every kind of prejudice (ethnic, sexual, religious and other). This tendency encourages groups that exclude diversity, that even in the digital environment nourish unbridled individualism which sometimes ends up fomenting spirals of hatred. In this way, what ought to be a window on the world becomes a showcase for exhibiting personal narcissism.

The Net is an opportunity to promote encounter with others, but it can also increase our self-isolation, like a web that can entrap us. Young people are the ones most exposed to the illusion that the *social web* can completely satisfy them on a relational level. There is the dangerous phenomenon of young people becoming "social hermits" who risk alienating themselves completely from society. This dramatic situation reveals a serious rupture in the relational fabric of society, one we cannot ignore.

This multiform and dangerous reality raises various questions of an ethical, social, juridical, political and economic

nature, and challenges the Church as well. While governments seek legal ways to regulate the web and to protect the original vision of a free, open and secure network, we all have the possibility and the responsibility to promote its positive use.

Clearly, it is not enough to multiply connections in order to increase mutual understanding. How, then, can we find our true communitarian identity, aware of the responsibility we have towards one another in the online network as well?

We are members one of another

A possible answer can be drawn from a third metaphor: that of the *body and the members*, which Saint Paul uses to describe the reciprocal relationship among people, based on the organism that unites them. "Therefore, putting away falsehood, speak the truth, each to his neighbour, for we are members one of another" (*Eph* 4:25). Being *members one of another* is the profound motivation with which the Apostle invites us to put away falsehood and speak the truth: the duty to guard the truth springs from the need not to belie the mutual relationship of communion. Truth is revealed in communion. Lies, on the other hand, are a selfish refusal to recognize that we are members of one body; they are a refusal to give ourselves to others, thus losing the only way to find ourselves.

The metaphor of the body and the members leads us to reflect on our identity, which is based on communion and on "otherness". As Christians, we all recognize ourselves as members of the one body whose head is Christ. This helps us not to see people as potential competitors, but to consider even our enemies as persons. We no longer need an adversary in order to define ourselves, because the all-encompassing gaze we learn from Christ leads us to discover otherness in a new way, as an integral part and condition of relationship and closeness.

Such a capacity for understanding and communication among human persons is based on the communion of love among the divine Persons. God is not Solitude, but Communion; he is Love, and therefore communication, because love always communicates; indeed, it communicates itself in order to encounter the other. In order to communicate with us and to communicate himself to us, God adapts himself to our language, establishing a real dialogue with humanity throughout history (cf. Second Vatican Ecumenical Council, Dogmatic Constitution Dei Verbum, 2).

By virtue of our being created in the image and likeness of God who is communion and communication-of-Self, we carry forever in our hearts the longing for living in communion, for belonging to a community. "Nothing, in fact, is as specific to our nature as entering into a relationship one with another, having need of one another," says Saint Basil.

The present context calls on all of us to invest in relationships, and to affirm the interpersonal nature of our humanity, including in and through the network. All the more so, we Christians are called to manifest that communion which marks our identity as believers. Faith itself, in fact, is a relationship, an encounter; and under the impetus of God's love, we can communicate, welcome and understand the gift of the other and respond to it.

Communion in the image of the Trinity is precisely what distinguishes the person from the individual. From faith in God who is Trinity, it follows that in order to be myself I need others. I am truly human, truly personal, only if I relate to others. In fact, the word "person" signifies the human being as a "face", whose face is turned towards the other, who is engaged with others. Our life becomes more human insofar as its nature becomes less individual and more personal; we see this authentic path of becoming more human in one who moves from being an *individual* who perceives the other as a rival, to a *person* who recognizes others as travelling companions.

From a "like" to an "amen"

The image of the body and the members reminds us that the use of the *social web* is complementary to an encounter in the flesh that comes alive through the body, heart, eyes, gaze, breath of the other. If the Net is used as an extension or expectation of such an encounter, then the network concept is not betrayed and remains a gether seek out the good to rediscover what unites us, then it is a

resource for communion. If a family uses the Net to be more connected, to then meet at table and look into each other's eyes, then it is a resource. If a Church community coordinates its activity through the network, and then celebrates the Eucharist together, then it is a resource. If the Net becomes an opportunity to share stories and experiences of beauty or suffering that are physically distant from us, in order to pray together and together seek out the good to rediscover what unites us, then it is a resource.

We can, in this way, move from diagnosis to treatment: opening the way for dialogue, for encounter, for "smiles" and expressions of tenderness... This is the network we want, a network created not to entrap, but to liberate, to protect a communion of people who are free. The Church herself is a network woven together by Eucharistic communion, where unity is based not on "likes", but on the truth, on the "Amen", by which each one clings to the Body of Christ, and welcomes others.

"Walls do not create prisons" Prison Ministry Sunday 11 August 2019 Pastoral Letter

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Jesus Christ,

On 17 March 1887, Marie Regnault, a prominent Parisian woman was found dead on the floor of her chamber, her throat cut and her body terribly mutilated. Lying near the door was the dead body of Annette, her servant whose throat had also been cut. On her bed was lifeless little Marie, the servant's daughter. The New York Times reported that the motive was robbery of jewelry. Within a week police caught Pranzini, the culprit and he was condemned to death for the triple murder.

St Therese of Lisieux

St. Therese of Lisieux was just 14 at the time, but she felt compelled to intervene. In her autobiography, The Story of a Soul she wrote that she felt that Pranzini would die impenitent. She wanted at all costs to keep him from falling into hell. She offered to God all the infinite merits of Our Lord and offered Holy Masses and mortifications to redeem Pranzini. On 1st September 1887 Therese read in the paper that when he was about to put his head into the device, he turned, took hold of the crucifix the priest was holding out to him, and kissed the sacred wounds three times! Then his soul went to receive the merciful sentence of him who declares that in heaven there will be more joy over one sinner who repents than over ninety- nine who have no need of repentance (Lk 15:7).

Prison Ministry Our Responsibility

Like St Therese of Lisieux, we Catholics have a great responsibility to liberate and redeem prisoners from eternal damnation. Have you ever thought of the plight of prisoners? Their suffering, humiliation, hopelessness, helplessness, frustration, and inhuman situations? Often, prisons are overcrowded, understaffed, unhygienic, and underfunded. Have you ever prayed for them, written a letter to them, and visited them? To remind us of this significant task, every year the Indian

DST takes up missionary apostolate among peoples and groups giving preference of those areas where the merciful glimpse of Jesus has not yet reached explicitly. The members are engaged in collective apostolate such as pastoral care, catechetics, formal and non-formal education, hospitals and dispensaries, family apostolate, social work, training and rehabilitation of the mentally challenged, physically handicapped, caring of the aged, prison ministry, social empowerment of the weak and the women, tribals and marginalized and the like which directly or indirectly involve all walks of life.

The founder of DST is the charismatic and zealous priest Very Reverend Father Jacob Thazhathel. Having been founded at Aruvithura, Kerala, South India on July 03, 1969 our Congregation has 322 professed sisters, witnessing the Gospel in different countries. DST has 82 candidates under 5 stages of formation in 8 centers in the states of Kerala, Madhya Pradesh and Meghalaya of India.

DST has got two provinces namely Santhome Province Pala and St. Thomas Province Ujjain. Santhome Province Pala is spread over the Dioceses of Pala, Kanjirapally, Idukki, Kalyan, Satna, Thamarassery, Palakkad, Tura and Gauhati having the Provincial House at Chethimattam, Pala. St. Thomas Province Ujjain is spread over the Dioceses of Ujjain, Bijnor, Chanda, Ernakulam, Kothamangalam, Thamarassery, Adilabad, Thalassery, and Sagar having the Provincial House at Khilchipur, Ujjain.

- 5.15.2. Individuals with the knowledge of sexual offences against minors and vulnerable adults shall report the case to the Eparchial Complaint Committee and also the civil authorities as required by the law.
- 5.16."The Procedural Norms for dealing with cases involving Sexual Abuse of Minors" promulgated by the CBCI on 1st October, 2015 shall be followed by the eparchy in the matter of reporting of and dealing with cases involving sexual offences against minors and vulnerable adults.

Major Seminarians' Diocesan Formation Programme 2019 (MSDFP)

The Major Seminarians' Diocesan Formation Programme (MSDFP) of Chanda was held from 29 April to 11 May 2019 at Bishop's Home campus, Ballarpur. The first week was specially set apart for language study. Fr. Satish Jamnik and Fr. Antony Munjanattu conducted Hindi Class for the students. There were also presentations of assignments and Marathi speeches. There was manual labor every day - cleaning Bishop's Home campus. In the second week the philosophy students continued manual labor and the students of theology and regents went to SVG for their retreat in preparation for the reception of Diaconate, Minor Orders and Vestition. Everyone had personal meeting with the Bishop. Bp. Ephrem and Fr. Binu met with the seminarians at different occasions for instructions, guidance and friendly chats. The minor Orders were conferred on 11 May in the Cathedral, Ballarpur.

Congratulations to each one of them. Parents and relatives of a few brothers along with number of Rev. Fathers and Sisters attended conferring of minor Orders held in the cathedral which was officiated by Bp. Ephrem Nariculam. Parents and relatives had a mission tour to a few of the stations in and around Balharshah. Thanks to everyone for co-operation.

Catholic Church dedicates the second Sunday of August for the incarcerated, known as Prison Ministry Sunday. According to the Institute for Criminal Policy Research (ICPR) report on 30 September 2018 there are 10,743,619 prisoners worldwide and 4, 19,623 brethren behind the bars in India. It is our duty to pray for them, visit them, and help them in their process of release, reformation, rehabilitation and redemption. For prisoners are our own brethren created in the image and likeness of God (Gen 1:27).

Prison Ministry India

To guide you in prison ministry, we have Prison Ministry India (PMI), a voluntary organization for the integral development of prisoners, their victims and families working under the Justice, Peace and Development Commission (JPDC) of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of India (CBCI). PMI volunteers visit brethren behind the bars regularly and build relationships with both staff and inmates. Every diocese has its office and a priest is appointed as its director to coordinate the ministry. Most of the major seminaries have prayer groups who organize liturgical ceremonies, cultural programs and extend spiritual, psychological and material assistance to prisoners. PMI has more than 30 rehabilitation centers in different states where released prisoners who are committed to renewing their lives can come and stay for their reformation and rehabilitation. I am happy to note that many religious communities come forward to take this challenging work of prisoners' release, reformation, rehabilitation and redemption. While I wholeheartedly appreciate them on behalf of the CBCI, I would also like to invite the laity to do prison ministry in association with the PMI volunteers and thereby acquire your ticket to heaven. For Jesus said, "Come, you that are blessed by my father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world ... for I was in prison and you visited me (Mt 25: 34-36). "Just as you did to one of the least of these who are members of my family you did it to me" (Mt 25: 40).

Jesus' Mission

Prison is a place where criminals are sent as punishment

by the judicial system with the intention to reform them. We may not like prison and prisoners. But Jesus was not like us. He loved prisoners, prostitutes, tax collectors, sinners and criminals in a special way and shed His blood to redeem them. He said, "the tax collectors and prostitutes are going into the Kingdom of God ahead of you" (Mt 21: 31). He visited the tax booth of Mathew, called him and made him His disciple. While He was eating with sinners and tax collectors, Jesus declared that He had come to call not the righteous but sinners for repentance (Lk 5: 32). Jesus proclaimed publicly His commitment to the prisoners in the Synagogue of Nazareth "He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives" (Lk 4:18). He revealed to us that He Himself lives in the hungry, thirsty, stranger, naked, sick, and prisoner (Mt 25: 31-46).

Walls Do Not Make Prisons

The theme of the 2019 Prison Ministry Sunday is Walls Do Not Create Prisons. This title is taken from Richard Lovelace's poem entitled "To Althea, from Prison." He wrote this poem in 1642 while imprisoned in the Gatehouse Prison adjoining Westminster Abbey and meant that stone walls and iron bars may prevent a person from moving freely in their body, but if they can still love freely, whoever they want and let their thoughts fly free, then in heart, mind and soul, they are free. Incarceration will not lock up one's thoughts, imagination, dreams, visions, insights, plans, and projects. If you have the right frame of mind - if your mind is innocent and quiet, then what others see as a prison can be a refuge, a hermitage, an ashram where reformations and revolutions can take place. For nothing will be impossible with God (Lk 1:37).

No Friend But the Mountains

Behrouz Boochani, an Iranian Kurd and an asylum seeker who was detained for years on Papua New Guineas Manus Island, is the best example for someone who lived the theme *Walls do not create Prisons*. From Manus Detention Center he wrote a book *No Friend But the Mountains* by text messaging through WhatsApp to his friend. This book won the 2019 Victorian Prize for Literature, worth A\$ 100,000, Australia's

- rectory or other living quarters of priests, unless the minor is accompanied by parent or an adult entrusted by the parent.
- 5.8.2. The minor/vulnerable adults is not alone with the church personnel in a residence, sleeping facility, locker room, rest room, dressing facility or other closed room or in an isolated area.
- 5.8.3. There is no physical disciplining of a minor/vulnerable adults. Corporal punishment is never acceptable. Disciplinary problems must be handled in co-ordination with the parents of the minor.
- 5.8.4. Overnight trips alone with a minor/vulnerable adults should be avoided.
- 5.8.5. Do not take photographs of the minors/vulnerable adults when they are unclothed or are dressing.
- 5.9. If a Church personnel observes that a minor/vulnerable adult is being abused by anyone (adult or minor), he/she shall take appropriate steps to intervene and to provide a safe environment to the victim.
- 5.10. If a Church personnel is accused of engaging in inappropriate conduct, he/she shall immediately notify the Eparchy and the Eparchial Complaint Committee.
- 5.11. While organizing events involving minors and vulnerable adults, adequate number of screened and trained adults shall be present for supervision.
- 5.12. Facilities for girls and boys shall be monitored during church services and all school and other activities.
- 5.13. Children shall not be released to strangers unless the parent or guardian requests in writing.
- 5.14. Only qualified drivers who satisfy all legal requirements to drive the vehicle may be engaged to drive any church/school vehicle or other vehicles chartered, rented or leased by the church/school/other institutions.
- 5.15. Church Personnel shall bear in mind and comply with the provisions in the POCSO Act 2012 regarding reporting of sexual offences:
 - 5.15.1. Church personnel are bound to report cases of sexual offences to the authorities concerned and also to cooperate with the investigation by civil authorities.

- 5.3. Church Personnel shall refrain from viewing and exhibiting any sexually explicit or morally inappropriate material in the presence of minors and vulnerable adults. Such materials include magazines, photos, videos, films, recordings, computer software, computer/video games or printed materials.
- 5.4. Church Personnel shall not indulge in or encourage sexually offensive humour and conversation in the presence of minors and vulnerable adults.
- 5.5. Church Personnel shall not engage in physical, mental, psychological, written or verbal harassment of staff, volunteers or parishioners and shall not tolerate such harassment by other Church Personnel. Harassment encompasses a broad range of behaviour including, but not limited to, the following:
 - 5.5.1. Physical or mental abuse
 - 5.5.2. Unwelcome sexual advances or touching
 - 5.5.3. Sexual comments or sexual jokes
 - 5.5.4. Requesting for sexual favours as a condition for employment, promotion, service benefits, compensation etc.
- 5.6. Professionalism requires that adults maintain clear boundaries in their relationship with the minors and vulnerable adults they are serving. For example:
 - 5.6.1. Excessive familiarity or intimacy between adults and minors is not permitted;
 - 5.6.2. Adults should not relate to minors, as if they are peers or friends;
 - 5.6.3. Adults may not give such undue attention or favourable treatment to a minor or group of minors which will indicate a special relationship or a favourite status.
- 5.7. In the matter of physical contact between adults and minors, a high degree of caution must be applied. Physical contact must be very strictly limited. Adults should ensure that there is no inappropriate physical contact with minors. Physical contact must be entirely non-sexual and incapable of being misconstrued by the minor or others.
- 5.8. Working with minors/vulnerable adults, Church personnel shall ensure that:
 - 5.8.1. No minor/vulnerable adults shall reside in any church the

richest literary prize. In response to winning the award, he said "We are forgotten people thrown on forgotten islands. I write in isolation with 700 other people who are hidden on a remote island in the north of Papua New Guinea. My goal has always been to make people in Australia and around the world clearly aware of the systematic torture of innocent people on the islands of Manus and Nauru for six years".

Liu Xiaobo (1955-2017)

Liu Xiaobo is another example of someone who lived in prison but beyond its walls. Known as Chinas Nelson Mandela, he was a writer, literary critic, human rights activist, and Nobel Peace Prize laureate who called for political reforms in China. He was incarcerated as a political prisoner in Jinzhou, Liaoning. During his fourth prison term, Liu was awarded the 2010 Nobel Peace Prize for "his long and non-violent struggle for fundamental human rights in China". He said that freedom of expression is the foundation of human rights, the source of humanity and the mother of truth. Like Mahatma Gandhi he stood for non-violent resistance and taught that even as man is faced with tyranny and suffering, he shall respond to hate with love, prejudice with tolerance, arrogance with humility, humiliation with dignity, and violence with reason.

Pope Francis

His Holiness Pope Francis on 25th January 2019, during a penitential liturgy at Las Garzas de Pacora detention center for minors, in Panama, denounced how society puts up "invisible walls" to marginalize sinners and criminals. In his homily, the Holy Father exhorted, "I invite you not to build walls but bridges to conquer evil with good, offence with forgiveness, and to live in peace with everyone". Let us join hands with Pope Francis in his attempt to abolish Capital punishment worldwide because it is "an attack" on human dignity.

Wall-Less Prison

In this context CBCI would like to appreciate one of the novel steps introduced by the Indian prison administration, the

novel steps introduced by the Indian prison administration, the Wall-less prison or the Open Air Camps. Self-responsibility plays a greater role in such system. Eligible convicted prisoners are sent to open air camps with the objective of making them learn self- dependence by lawful means of livelihood and social interaction. These half way homes have changed the scenario of prison discipline as the prisoner becomes more rule abiding and relaxed when living with family. The presence of family avoids many unwanted distractions that a person may otherwise indulge in.

Conclusion

Through the celebration of Prison Ministry Sunday, the Church wants to affirm to each one of those 4,19,623 prisoners held inside 1401 prisons in India that walls do not make prisons. What matters is our attitude, our perception, our vision, our outlook, our acceptance of the will of God! Dear brothers and sisters in prison, we walk with you, pray for you and support you. God is your stronghold, He will restore your life. Dear brothers and sisters outside the prison, let us hear the cry of prisoners and try our best to respond with our prayer, presence and assistance like St Therese of Lisieux. As the Letter to the Hebrews says, "Remember those who are in prison as though you were in prison with them" (Heb 13:2). Along with my brother Bishops, I express my sincere gratitude for the generous contribution towards this ministry and acknowledge the dedicated service of PMI volunteers in liberating, reforming, rehabilitating and redeeming prisoners. May the patron saint of Prison Ministry India, St. Maximilian Kolbe guide you and may Mary our Blessed Mother be always there to protect you.

THE POLICY FOR THE SAFETY OF MINORS AND VULNERABLE ADULTS (EPARCHY OF CHANDA) Extract

5. CODE OF CONDUCT

- 5.1. Church Personnel shall adhere to all applicable Civil Laws, the Canon Law, professional code of conduct and ethical norms so as to prevent and deal with cases of sexual assault or harassment of minors and vulnerable adults.
- 5.2. Church Personnel shall seek to provide a safe environment to the minors and the vulnerable adults which is just, non-discriminatory, free from all forms of sexual abuse or exploitation and ensuring their dignity and personal safety.


PROJECT DIRECTOR

(Consultant and Co-ordinator of Projects for parishes and the diocesan institutions)

Job description

- 1. Any Priest-in-Charge of parishes or diocesan institutions is free to avail his services.
- 2. At the request of Bishop/Curia/Individual priest or religious he is to prepare the projects. However, it is highly recommended that a nutshell of the project is presented to him or required information is provided with.
- 3. The estimate is to be collected by the individual priest or concerned person as directed.
- 4. The project director is to co-ordinate project implementation as per project stipulations:
 - i. Make sure that the project stipulations are strictly followed and if not it should be intimated to the bishop.
 - ii. Make sure that the interim report is sent within six months of the receipt of first instalment.
 - iii. Completion report is to be sent within three months of the completion of the project. It should be accompanied with all necessary documents: bills, vouchers, photos, audit statement etc. as directed by the donor agency
- 5. Please keep a project copy in the Project Director's office, in Bishop's office as well as in the respective station/institution.
- 6. Follow up the project as required, with regard to audited report, adherence to project stipulations, time frame-work etc.
- 7. Inform Bishop's office regarding project completion and transfer the report to respective files.
- 8. Update the projects under pending to the bishop and submit in every six months a project status to the Curia.
- 9. Explore possibilities of new projects from different agencies and inform the bishop of the same.
- 10. Update all running projects in every six months.
- 11. Obtain budget of the project in advance, duly approved by the donating agency.
- 12. Make necessary entries to the project directory preserved in
