### PASTORAL LETTER I

# On Bishop Januarius Palathuruthy CMI, the first bishop and the architect of Chanda

Dear Fathers, Brothers, Sisters, and my dear People,

### "THY KINGDOM COME"

It is now twenty five years elapsed since Bp. Januarius CMI, the architect and the first bishop of Chanda departed us for eternal rest. May his soul Rest In Peace. Bp. Januarius completes twenty five years on 28 March 2020 of his life in heavenly abode. We shall firmly believe that he is interceding for us before God Almighty. On this auspicious occasion I felt it is worth looking back to his contribution to the Chanda Mission and his 'being' to the Church and CMI Congregation.

He was a tireless worker, a visionary, a missionary to the poor and who touched the soul of the land. He was for the poor and of the poor. Simplicity was a trait of his character not only in his person but also in his missionary endeavours. He knew Christ in depth, the Christ who had no place to lay his head (Lk. 9:58), Christ who was solace for the broken hearted (Ps. 34:18), Christ who healed the sick (Lk. 5:17-26) and Christ who gave bread to the hungry (Mt. 25:35-40). Bp. Januarius exhorted his missionaries to follow the suit. He was not for big structures, projects and he was not for institutions but he was for evangelization, communication and animation. He intended to share life, the divine, with others in abundance (Jn. 10:10), which Christ brought and shared with us. He kept simplicity as a style not only in life but also in constructions, travel and use of things for daily affairs.

His witty axioms manifested his person: He often used to

tell his missionaries that he is for "Periphery to Centre". He stood for the abandoned and marginalized and sought for them in the peripheries. There lives - the displaced, the abandoned and the marginalized, so much so even now 80% of the mission stations of Chanda diocese are in villages. To parents through children was another axiom that induced him to start boardings in the diocese. The presence of children in the parish/mission stations not only gave life to the stations but also opened new entry points to the people's lives and villages. 'Micro versus Macro' clearly articulates his orientation for poverty, simplicity and complacency. He believed that money is for genuine need and not for luxury. He attracted the missionaries to be happy with the bare minimum and make the maximum utility of what is already available. So much so, he always preferred small projects rather than larger ones.

He was exceptionally open to the living realities around. Religious tolerance was very much appreciated by him and he firmly stood for the same. He was open to dialogue and respected people of all faiths and traditions. Religions should not become barriers in human relations. On the other hand it should be a connecting thread among persons of different faiths. He maintained human relations irrespective of any such barriers. He kept warm relations with Vinobha Bhave, Baba Amte and people of all walks of life. He was hospitable to all those who visited him and he took time to visit others as time and occasions permitted.

As a philosopher he had sharp memory and target orientation in mission endeavours. He availed every opportunity to share everything dynamically divine with others. Interestingly it was his Episcopal motto: 'To share everything dynamically

divine'(*Sambhajemahi Dhivyani*). He had targets, planned projects and implemented them effectively. He bought land practically attached to every station and highly encouraged farming. His vision was that every station should run by its own income. As the time passed, the things have changed and farm yieldings are not supportive yet the land bought are great assets today to the respective stations.

Another striking character in him was his hospitality. He took great strides to receive guests in his residence and took care of them even to the least of their needs. He did not take pride in being a bishop but moved with everyone, even to strangers freely and fairly. He had great concern for missionaries. He kept visiting them regularly and made up-to-date about every missionary and every station at regular intervals. Before executing any project or program in the mission he made sure that a study/research preceded to make the project/program feasible to execute effectively. He took interest to give continuous guidance to his co-missionaries with regard to mission endeavours, evangelization pedagogy, missionary life-style, liturgical life, cultural adaptation etc.,

He challenged his missionaries by his life-style. His famous words "we did not imitate, we did not compete but Chanda was a challenge of the time" really challenged everyone. So much so many were attracted to come to Chanda mission to be missionaries. Under his leadership they did a great job in Chanda mission. So much so in a span of 25 years, by the jubilee year of the mission the number of Catholics increased from 600 in 1962 to above 20,000 in 1987. The increase in the number of mission stations was by 10 times - just from four to above forty. Thanks to all the pioneering missionaries. The pioneering missionaries

have become a challenge to us even today. Let us reconnect ourselves to keep the spirit alive and be genuine missionaries. Mission work is not the job of Fathers, Brothers and Sisters only, but of all Christians. By the reception of baptism, every Christian is called to be a missionary.

Bishop Januarius had a unique approach to evangelization. "The missionary vision of Bishop Januarius is widely acclaimed as something very unique. This is an attempt to dive deep into that uniqueness of his vision and missionary methodology, and to draw from that analysis, a deeper inspiration and a clearer orientation for our future course of evangelization in North Indian Missions" (Mathew Kaniamparampil, A unique Approach to Evangelization in Missiology for Third millennium, Ed. Thomas Aikara p.31). "The spiritual vision, the intellectual acumen and the St. Paul like mission zeal of Bp. Januarius has brought mission into its evangelical maturity" acclaimed Cardinal Antony Padiyara in 1988. "He inspired the missionaries to penetrate the interior villages and understand their problems and needs, identifying themselves with the poor and the marginalized. He had a special soft corner for the oppressed and the downtrodden. He would visualize plans for their integrated development. He inspired the Fathers to prepare and execute projects for their social, economic, cultural and educational development" (ibid. 36).

So my dear Fathers, Brothers, Sisters and my dear People, on the occasion of the happy memories of the twenty fifth death anniversary of Bp. Januarius, let us be resolved to take up the challenge once again to translate his vision into a great mission, paving the way for a greater change in this entire area and era, assisting the people to improve themselves by the power of the

gospel values. Indeed, the challenges have multiplied today, than of his times, let us rely on the faith, hope and zeal of St. Paul: If Christ is with us, who is against us? (Rom: 8.31). May his soul Rest In Peace. May our souls reverberate in pursuance of his zeal for souls, love for the people, and hope for the establishment of God's kingdom.

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# PASTORAL LETTER II

On 'Word of God Sunday'

Dear Missionaries,

### **Thy Kingdom Come!**

By apostolic letter *Aperuit Illus* (30.09.2019) Pope Francis instituted the Sunday of the Word of God. It is great that a Sunday is dedicated to the Word of God, though it is nothing new to our diocese as we have dedicated a whole year - 2019, *Bible Vaachan Varsh* - for the divine word. However, the celebration of the Sunday of the word of God is an annual event in the universal Church is an amazing news for all of us. Undoubtedly it will boost the importance of the word of God in the life of the Church. Pope has assigned the third Sunday in ordinary time as per liturgical calendar of the Latin Church, which falls in the second part of January every year. We shall celebrate it as per the direction from the Major archiepiscopal Curia, Mount St. Thomas, Kakkanad (See page 26). In this pastoral letter, I wish to highlight the pope's intention of establishing it and the importance of the divine word in the life of a

Christian and in particular that in our missionary endeavours.

Holy Father started the apostolic letter with a gospel quote: "He opened their minds to understand the scripture" (Lk. 24:45). I firmly believe and it is my experience that, the word of God is effective to open our minds to transform our hearts to be good and godly. The author of Hebrews corroborates the transforming power of the word of God in 4:12: "Indeed, the word of God is living and active, sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing until it divides soul from spirit, joints from marrow; it is able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart". One who submits oneself to the divine word allows it to change us according to the divine plan. God's word allows the Holy Spirit to sink into the brokenness, abandonment and woundedness of human life and heal it. It is an experience of salvation and healthy living in mind, body and spirit.

St. Ephrem the Syrian, the great doctor of the Church of Eastern tradition reminds us of the unfathomable riches of the divine word in his commentary on the *Diatessaron* (1;18): "The Lord has coloured his word with diverse beauties, so that those who study it can contemplate what stirs them. He has hidden in his word all treasures, so that each of us may find riches in what he or she contemplates". It is apt to quote St. Jerome here: "Ignorance of scriptures is ignorance of Christ". Indeed the divine word is Emmanuel - God with us. As St. Augustine reminds us: when we read the divine word, God speaks to us and when we pray God listens to us. He reminds us again: "Bible is God's love letter to the humankind". So my dear missionaries let us avail the treasures of divine wisdom within our reach, always and everywhere, to touch and taste how good is our God (Ps. 34:8).

In the light of these reflections, it is befitting to read again contemplatively the recent documents on the word of God in particular the Vatican II dogmatic constitution *Dei Verbum* and Apostolic Exhortation of Pope Benedict XVI *Verbum Domini*. The

former delineates the importance the Holy Scripture for the life of the Church and the latter emphasizes in particular the performative character of the Word of God, especially in the context of the liturgy, in which its distinctively sacramental character comes to the fore.

A take away for pastoral life of missionaries particularly priests is intention of well prepared homilies. "In this unity born of listening, pastors are primarily responsible for explaining sacred Scripture and helping everyone to understand it. Since it is the people's book, those called to be ministers of the word must feel an urgent need to make it accessible to their community. The homily, in particular, has a distinctive function, for it possesses "a quasisacramental character" (Evangelii Gaudium, 142). Helping people to enter more deeply into the word of God through simple and suitable language will allow priests themselves to discover the "beauty of the images used by the Lord to encourage the practice of the good" (ibid.). This is a pastoral opportunity that should not be wasted! For many of our faithful, in fact, this is the only opportunity they have to grasp the beauty of God's word and to see it applied to their daily lives. Consequently, sufficient time must be devoted to the preparation of the homily. A commentary on the sacred readings cannot be improvised. Those of us who are preachers should not give long, pedantic homilies or wander off into unrelated topics. When we take time to pray and meditate on the sacred text, we can speak from the heart and thus reach the hearts of those who hear us, conveying what is essential and capable of bearing fruit. May we never tire of devoting time and prayer to Scripture, so that it may be received "not as a human word but as what it really is, the word of God" (1 Thess 2:13). Catechists, too, in their ministry of helping people to grow in their faith, ought to feel an urgent need for personal renewal through familiarity with, and study of, the sacred Scriptures. This will help them foster in their hearers a true dialogue with the word of God" (Aperuit Illis #5).

In paragraph 6 the pope vehemently affirm the inevitable and indissoluble connection of the word of God with the Holy Eucharist. Regular reading of sacred scripture and the celebration of the Eucharist make it possible for us to see ourselves as part of one another. As the Vatican Council II teaches, "the Church has always venerated the Lord's body, in that she never ceases, above all in the sacred liturgy, to partake of the bread of life and to offer it to the faithful from the one table of the word of God and the body of Christ (*Dei Verbum*, 21). In the Apostolic letter pope earnestly and gently reminds every priest to take homily seriously, sincerely and sensibly. I suggest that we take homily as a daily spiritual nourishment not only for listeners but also for ourselves.

Towards the end of the Apostolic Letter pope pose a challenge the word of God raises that has to do with love. God's word constantly reminds us of the merciful love of the Father who calls his children to live in love. It is to show God's compassion in daily life. The parable of Lazarus and rich man points to it (Lk. 16:19-31). In other words we are called to witness God's compassion palpable to our people in all our interactions. "Love one another as I have loved you" (Jn. 13:34). It is Christ's great command.

So my dear missionaries, let us resolve to celebrate the Sunday of the Word of God every year meaningfully and faithfully. It is befitting that we focus attention on the importance of the Word of God and that of proclamation as we celebrate 2020 as *Susamachar Ghoshana Varsh*. God bless you all.

# MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS **FOR LENT 2020**

"We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God" (2 Cor 5:20)

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

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This year the Lord grants us, once again, a favourable time to prepare to celebrate with renewed hearts the great mystery of the death and resurrection of Jesus, the cornerstone of our personal and communal Christian life. We must continually return to this mystery in mind and heart, for it will continue to grow within us in the measure that we are open to its spiritual power and respond with freedom and generosity.

# 1. The paschal mystery as the basis of conversion

Christian joy flows from listening to, and accepting, the Good News of the death and resurrection of Jesus. This kerygma sums up the mystery of a love "so real, so true, so concrete, that it invites us to a relationship of openness and fruitful dialogue" (Christus Vivit, 117). Whoever believes this message rejects the lie that our life is ours to do with as we will. Rather, life is born of the love of God our Father, from his desire to grant us life in abundance (cf. Jn 10:10). If we listen instead to the tempting voice of the "father of lies" (Jn 8:44), we risk sinking into the abyss of absurdity, and experiencing hell here on earth, as all too many tragic events in the personal and collective human experience sadly bear witness.

In this Lent of 2020, I would like to share with every Christian what I wrote to young people in the Apostolic Exhortation Christus Vivit: "Keep your eyes fixed on the outstretched arms of Christ crucified, let yourself be saved over and over again. And when you go to confess your sins, believe firmly in his mercy which frees you of your guilt. Contemplate his blood poured out with such great love, and let yourself be cleansed by it. In this way, you can be reborn ever anew" (No. 123). Jesus' Pasch is not a past event; rather, through the power of the Holy Spirit it is ever present, enabling us to see and touch with faith the flesh of Christ in those who suffer.

### 2. The urgency of conversion

It is good to contemplate more deeply the paschal mystery through which God's mercy has been bestowed upon us. Indeed, the experience of mercy is only possible in a "face to face" relationship with the crucified and risen Lord "who loved me and gave himself for me" (*Gal* 2:20), in a heartfelt dialogue between friends. That is why prayer is so important in Lent. Even more than a duty, prayer is an expression of our need to respond to God's love which always precedes and sustains us. Christians pray in the knowledge that, although unworthy, we are still loved. Prayer can take any number of different forms, but what truly matters in God's eyes is that it penetrates deep within us and chips away at our hardness of heart, in order to convert us ever more fully to God and to his will.

In this favourable season, then, may we allow ourselves to be led like Israel into the desert (cf. *Hos* 2:14), so that we can at last hear our Spouse's voice and allow it to resound ever more deeply within us. The more fully we are engaged with his word, the more we will experience the mercy he freely gives us. May we not let this time of grace pass in vain, in the foolish illusion that we can control the times and means of our conversion to him.

# 3. God's passionate will to dialogue with his children

The fact that the Lord once again offers us a favourable time for our conversion should never be taken for granted. This new opportunity ought to awaken in us a sense of gratitude and stir us from our sloth. Despite the sometimes tragic presence of evil in our lives, and in the life of the Church and the world, this opportunity to change our course expresses God's unwavering will not to interrupt his dialogue of salvation with us. In the crucified Jesus, who knew no sin, yet for our sake was made to be sin (cf. 2 Cor 5:21), this saving will led the Father to burden his Son with the weight of our sins, thus, in the expression of Pope Benedict XVI, "turning of God against himself" (Deus Caritas Est, 12). For God also loves his enemies (cf. Mt 5:43-48).

The dialogue that God wishes to establish with each of us through the paschal mystery of his Son has nothing to do with empty

chatter, like that attributed to the ancient inhabitants of Athens, who "spent their time in nothing except telling or hearing something new" (*Acts* 17:21). Such chatter, determined by an empty and superficial curiosity, characterizes worldliness in every age; in our own day, it can also result in improper use of the media.

### 4. A richness to be shared, not kept for oneself

Putting the paschal mystery at the centre of our lives means feeling compassion towards the wounds of the crucified Christ present in the many innocent victims of wars, in attacks on life, from that of the unborn to that of the elderly, and various forms of violence. They are likewise present in environmental disasters, the unequal distribution of the earth's goods, human trafficking in all its forms, and the unbridled thirst for profit, which is a form of idolatry.

Today too, there is a need to appeal to men and women of good will to share, by almsgiving, their goods with those most in need, as a means of personally participating in the building of a better world. Charitable giving makes us more human, whereas hoarding risks making us less human, imprisoned by our own selfishness. We can and must go even further, and consider the structural aspects of our economic life. For this reason, in the midst of Lent this year, from 26 to 28 March, I have convened a meeting in Assisi with young economists, entrepreneurs and change-makers, with the aim of shaping a more just and inclusive economy. As the Church's magisterium has often repeated, political life represents an eminent form of charity (cf. Pius XI, *Address to the Italian Federation of Catholic University Students*, 18 December 1927). The same holds true for economic life, which can be approached in the same evangelical spirit, the spirit of the Beatitudes.

I ask Mary Most Holy to pray that our Lenten celebration will open our hearts to hear God's call to be reconciled to himself, to fix our gaze on the paschal mystery, and to be converted to an open and sincere dialogue with him. In this way, we will become what Christ asks his disciples to be: the salt of the earth and the light of the world (cf. *Mt* 5:13-14).

Dialogue: The Path to Truth and Charity

### INTRODUCTION

We, the 192 member Bishops of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of India, assembled for our XXXIV Plenary Assembly at St. John's National Academy of Health Sciences, Bengaluru from 13-19February 2020. Prompted by our fidelity to Jesus Christ and unflinching loyalty to our beloved motherland we reflected, meditated and deliberated on the ever relevant theme, "Dialogue: The Path to Truth and Charity." We also sought to sincerely evaluate the quality of our apostolic ministry and be renewed in the Spirit to be servant leaders of our people after the heart of Christ who came "to serve and not to be served" (Mark 10, 48).

The Church, the community of faith in Jesus Christ, has integral and all-inclusive dialogue at her heart. Indeed dialogue belongs to the very essence of the Christian faith. All through her history the Church has made earnest efforts to engage in dialogue at different levels. As a community of human beings the Church lives in civil society and body politic, continuously inspiring us to be loyal citizens of India. The

noteworthy contribution of the Church in the field of education, health care and social transformation has been consistently acknowledged by the people of India.

### INDIA: UNITY IN DIVERSITY

The hallmark of Indian society is its pluralism. From ancient times, India has been a mosaic of many religions, cultures and languages with a strong Indian identity. What unites us is stronger and deeper than what divides us. We are proud of our Constitution that envisions a Sovereign Socialist Secular Democratic Republic which resolved to secure for all its citizens Justice, Liberty, Equality and Fraternity as enshrined in the Preamble. Justice is spelt out as social, economic and political; Liberty is explained as liberty of thought, expression, belief, faith and worship; and Equality is understood as equality of status and opportunity. These Constitutional values form the ethos of Indian identity that promotes Fraternity which leads to the dignity of the individual and unity and integrity of the nation. Every citizen must be ever vigilant against any attempt to undermine the ennobling human vision of the Constitution so that our beloved country ever remains united.

### **BIBLICAL FOUNDATIONS**

Various streams of thoughts running through the biblical texts enrich our understanding of the necessity of dialogue among peoples and cultures. Dialogue with other religions is integral to the Biblical Revelation. The different aspects of dialogue in the Bible are rooted in our faith in God as Trinity: God as the Creator of all, the universal presence of God's Spirit, and Jesus as the Saviour of all mankind. In the Gospels, Jesus' encounters with people reveal that God is the Father of all. The Kingdom of God that Jesus preached embodies the love of God, irrespective of race, sex, colour, class, language and creed. The Good News of Jesus calls upon humanity to establish a society of justice, equality, love, forgiveness and peace. Dialogue begins and grows when we open ourselves to the Lord, and by committing ourselves to his words and deeds, live the mystery of his death and resurrection which paves the path to truth and charity. For example, in the dialogue with the Samaritan woman, Jesus unveils the true

horizons of relating with God in truth and spirit. He starts with the dialogue of life and moves to the dialogue of action which is followed by the dialogue of sharing the religious experience, and eventually the dialogue leads to the witnessing of truth.

### **CHURCH TEACHINGS**

The Church encourages believers to respect each other and one another's religious tradition, thus cooperating with one another to promote peace and harmony and work for the common good of all. Pope Francis has urged all people of good will to make every effort to establish peace in society by "inviting all persons who believe in God to unite and work together, so that it may serve as a guide for future generations to advance a culture of mutual respect in the awareness of the great divine grace that makes all human beings brothers and sisters...called to express this human fraternity by safeguarding creation and the entire universe, and supporting all persons, especially the poorest and those most in need..." (Document on Human Fraternity, 4th February 2019, Abu Dhabi).

Dialogue is rooted in the very vocation of the Church. Being open to dialogue, calls for being absolutely consistent with one's own religious tradition. Believers enter into each other's depth of life through dialogue.

### DIALOGUE WITH CULTURES AND RELIGIONS

Every community that lives in India possesses its own cultural identity with its richness, which must be respected at any cost. Attempts to homogenize and impose a mono-cultural pattern pose serious threats to the cultural patrimony of our country. As our Constitution envisions, there cannot be any meaningful dialogue of culture without acknowledging the primacy of human person. People of every culture and religion and those who profess no religion must be esteemed with mutual respect which eventually leads to human fraternity. No culture or religion shall dominate over other cultures and religions. Subduing certain cultures by the dominant culture will destroy the peace and harmony existing in the country. "The enemy of fraternity is an individualism which translates into the desire to affirm oneself and

one's own group above others. Religious behaviour, therefore, needs continually to be purified from the recurrent temptation to judge others as enemies and adversaries." (Document on Human Fraternity, 4th February 2019, Abu Dhabi).

# DIALOGUE WITH THE POOR, THE DALITS AND TRIBAL PEOPLE

Dialogue with the poor, the Dalits and Tribal people is an urgent priority in the context of India. The Dalits and Tribal people are continually denied their human rights socially. Every step taken in favour of their liberation by eradicating poverty, exploitation, discrimination, and every other form of sinful structures of society is an effective means of dialogue. However, dialogue with the poor shall not be limited only to the works of mercy. The term 'the Church of the poor' reflects the constant self-understanding of Christians that the poor stand in the place of Christ, and therefore charity and justice must be an essential and central dimension of what it means to be a follower of Christ. In this context, we urge the State authorities to take adequate steps to ensure justice to the Dalit Christians and the Tribal people.

### **DIALOGUE WITH NATURE**

Dialogue with nature is another important aspect. The earth, our common home, which was created to support life and give praise to God, is crying out with pain because human activity is destroying it. All who believe in God and all people of good will have an obligation to protect the ecological equilibrium of the earth, intended by the Creator. Therefore dialogue with nature includes serious steps to mitigate climate change, clean the land and the seas, and start treating all of creation with respect and concern.

### **DIALOGUE WITH THE UNBORN**

Dialogue should not be limited to those who are born; rather the right to life of the unborn must also be taken seriously into account. We believe that the human being is to be respected and treated as a person from the moment of conception, that each and every human life has inherent dignity, and thus must be treated with the respect due to a human person from womb to tomb. The steps to legalise abortion even to the extent of

six months must be condemned as a gross injustice which undermines the right to life of the unborn. We appeal to the State authorities that it immediately withdraw the Bill in the Parliament.

### **DIALOGUE OF PEACE**

Interreligious dialogue is one of the most pressing needs of our times. There will be no peace among nations without peace among religions. There will be no peace among religions without dialogue among religions. We are alarmed by continuous persecution on a global level endured by innocent people at the hands of fundamentalist and terrorist groups. Dialogue in India should aim at collaboration in areas such as peace-building, protection of the environment, eradication of poverty and ensuring the human dignity of all, especially of women and children. Besides, it means that we condemn all wars, violence and terrorism that create insurmountable blocks to dialogue. We pledge ourselves to engage in a process of dialogue for a reconciled society.

### **AFERVENTAPPEAL**

We believe that patriotism is different from narrow and divisive cultural nationalism, which is radically different from Constitutional nationalism. No one has the right to question the patriotism of any Indian citizen on subjective grounds. Authentic patriotism unites us amidst divergences. Patriotism is defined as directing the attention of the citizens to the good of the whole human family, united by the different ties which bind together races, people and nations. "All Christians must be aware of their sense of responsibility and their service of the common good. They must recognize the legitimacy of different opinions with regard to temporal solutions, and respect citizens, who, even as a group, defend their points of view by honest methods" (Church in the Modern World, no. 75). False nationalistic ideologies that instigate contempt for cultures other than the majoritarian dominant culture are capable of perpetrating atrocities. It is necessary to clarify the essential difference between patriotism and pseudo nationalism. Patriotism builds up the nation while pseudo nationalism destroys the integrity, unity and harmony of the nation. Nationalism, particularly in its most radical and extreme forms, is thus

the antithesis of true patriotism. We appeal to the State authorities to ensure that pseudo nationalism does not continue to give rise to new forms of totalitarianism. Together with the framers of the Constitution, we, the Catholic Bishops of India, affirm that religion shall not be a criterion for determining Indian citizenship. The authorities should come forward with sincere and effective means to erase the sense of fear, anxiety and uncertainty spreading in the country, especially among the religious minorities. Needless to say that dissent should not be misconstrued as un-patriotism. Democracy cannot be built on monologue. We call upon the State authorities that it is right time to sit around the common table, a place of conversation and of shared hopes. Against the attempts at creating cultural isolation in our beloved country, dialogue will make the elements that are seemingly a barrier or a wall, a bridge of relationship. "Identity and dialogue are not enemies. Our own cultural identity is strengthened and enriched as a result of dialogue with those unlike ourselves. Nor is our authentic identity preserved by an impoverished isolation." (Pope Francis, Querida Amazonia, n. 37).

### **CONCLUSION**

Dialogue is indeed the path to truth and charity. Let us pray that dialogue grows in every family, at all levels of the Church, among the Christians, among religions and cultures, and among the nations so that God's Kingdom of reconciliation, justice, peace and love may be established. Though deeply concerned and anguished with what is happening in our country, we are filled with hope inspired by faith and the innate goodness of all our fellow citizens. We appreciate the majority who uphold the secular values of our nation. We are determined to continue to collaborate in the work of building our great nation, Mother India.

May the Blessed Virgin Mary, who manifested the exemplary spirit of dialogue through her maternal intercession, guide each one of us on the path of truth and charity!

# Cardinal George Alenchery Major Archbishop Syro-Malabar Church

Dear Archbishops and Bishops,

I write you this on the basis of a letter jointly signed by His Eminence Cardinal Leonardo Sandri, the Prefect of the Congregation for the Oriental Churches and Archbishop Rino Fisichella, the President of the Pontifical Council for the Promotion of the New Evangelization, inviting our Church to celebrate the Sunday of the Word of God in our Church with due importance as envisaged by Holy Father Pope Francis in his Apostolic Letter Aperuitillis. The Sunday of the Word of God is instituted on the III Sunday of the Ordinary time according to the Latin liturgical calendar. As mentioned in the letter indicated above, this Sunday falls between 21 and 27 January every year. As per the Syro-Malabar liturgical calendar, this Sunday falls in the season of Epiphany. The observation of this Sunday is very much linked to the Unity Octave which is from 18-25 January. So inevitably, this

Sunday is either during the Unity Octave or the Sunday immediately after the Unity Octave. In 2020, the Sunday dedicated for the Word of God is 26 January.

The directive part of the *motupropriois* as follows: "The various communities will find their own ways to mark this Sunday with a certain solemnity. It is important, however, that in the Eucharistic celebration the sacred text be enthroned, in order to focus the attention of the assembly on the normative value of God's word. On this Sunday, it would be particularly appropriate to highlight the proclamation of the word of the Lord and to emphasize in the homily the honour that it is due. ...In this regard, renewed efforts should be made to provide members of the faithful with the training needed to be genuine proclaimers of the word..." (No. 3). Let us earnestly respond to the invitation of the Holy Father with enthusiasm and make every attempt to celebrate this Sunday with solemnity so that our faithful can make use of this occasion to deepen their knowledge in the Word of God and make it more experiential. Please find herewith attached the letter I received from the above mentioned prelates and a copy of the Apostolic Letter Aperuitillis.

I request you to give necessary instructions regarding the celebration of this Sunday in your Eparchy/Archeparchy.

# WHEN.... Preparing a Budget (General Guidelines)

- 1. Read through previous years' presented budget carefully
- 2. Collect all accounts of income and expenditure as per respective heads in the budget format.
- 3. Make sure all bills, vouchers, receipts are ready/available with date, serial number etc. (there should be pakka bills for all items).
- 4. Update bank pass book and check cash balance (make cash balance around Rs. 1000/- or less).
- 5. Ascertain that when all payments (salary, shopping, maintenances, nursery, school, dispensary, loan repayments, donations etc.) are done and receipts are received.
- 6. Renew FD receipts as required.
- 7. Enter all diocesan/church collections to the journal.
- 8. Make sure no cheque payment is in pending (ref. cheque issued and not yet credited). See that all cheques are cleared/debited from our account in the bank (issue cheques accordingly at least 2 weeks in advance).
- 9. Implementation of projects and it should be made up to date as per the budget stipulations.
- 10. Discuss in the core-team with regard to the needs of the station to propose new projects for the budget year and also long term needs. If possible state reasons for the new projects.
- 11. Check whether all worship expenses are properly entered into the journal.
- 12. Calculate farm products of the station (vegetables, dairy income, field yieldings, livestock etc.) and enter into the accounts. Enter them in the income and expenditure columns.

- 13. Add all receipts of sale of old things from campus (scrap selling).
- 14. Check all medical bills are paid and entered into account.
- 15. Normally the budget is presented with actual of 9 months and budget of 12 months.
- 16. Make sure all payments of electricity, taxes & rates, water connection, news paper, telephone etc. is done before budget preparation starts.
- 17. Any pending bills (uniform, *kirana* etc.) either should be paid or transfer to the next year and ask for new dated bill for the forthcoming year.
- 18. Check that previous year's budget is followed as per the direction from the Diocesan Finance Office/Curia.
- 19. As soon as PPT Meeting date is announced start preparation of the budget in consultation with the Finance department.
- 20. Budget preparation should be started by 1 December every year as PPT meeting falls in January.
- 21. Make sure that PF, TDS (Tax Deduction at Source) are paid for the year before budget is prepared.
- 22. Vehicle insurance, land, building tax are paid on time and entered into journal. (Personnel vehicle, if any, cannot be paid for such items from the common fund and vice versa)
- 23. Make sure that tri-monthly account is submitted regularly and up to December is done by all means before budget is prepared each year.
- 24. 10% of Sunday collection to be given to Bishop's Charity Fund from all stations that are declared parishes. Naturally it should be accounted separately in the daily journal.

### Report

The Diocesan Pastoral Council (DPC) meeting of the diocese for the year 2019 began by a prayer song invoking the presence of the Holy Spirit. Fr.Varghese Puthuparambil CMI, the Vicar General, welcomed every one and Report of the previous year was presented. Bp. Ephrem presided over the meeting.

Keynote was given by Bishop Ephrem Nariculam. In his introductory speech, he reminded everyone the importance of DPC in a diocese. He spoke about Role of the Laity in the Church. It is a forum to listen to the laity. Bishop insisted that the new initiatives in the diocese as well as various challenges that the Church faces today would be discussed in the DPC meeting. DPC meeting is also a forum to know the various activities of the departments in the Diocese.

After the tea break bishop announced some of the forthcoming events in the diocese. The ordinations of Bro. Jose Zade and Bro. Francis Minj will be at Allapally Church in the month of April 2020. Year 2021 will be dedicated as *Harith Varsh*. Focus of *Susamachar Ghoshana Varsh* 2020 should be on evangelization. The purpose of the year is to bring back the flock

who had left the Church. Claretian Fathers have started a mission at Murumgaon. Kurkheda mission is flourishing. Bishop shared about his *Ad Limina* visit to Rome on 3<sup>rd</sup> Oct 2019 and his experience of 3 hours of being with the Pope along with other Syro-Malabar bishops.

Then bishop shared about the dream projects and its present status such as Talent Club, Post-metric hostel and Mul project etc. He told that the pastoral plan is ready for the next fifteen years. Coming years will be celebrated with specific purposes as follows.

2020 - Year of evangelization.

2021 - Green Year.

2022 - Diamond Jubilee of the Diocese. Diocese will be constructing 60 houses.

2023 - Year of Sacrament

2024 - Year of Decalogue

2025 - Year of the precepts of the Church

2026 - Year of Creed

2027 - Year of Beatitudes

2028 - Marian Year

2029 - Year of Saints

2030 - Year of Family

2031 - Year of Aged and the Sick

2032 - Year of Youth and Children

2033 - The Great Jubilee Year of Jesus' Paschal Event

Bishop also shared about some of the important initiatives taken place in the diocese such as inauguration of Holy Childhood Association. Youth, children and women empowerment programmes are of great concern of the diocese. Village chapel renovations are started and by 2025 it is hoped to be completed. Bishops Canonical visits are going on in the parishes. Bishop

Januarius' 25<sup>th</sup> Death Anniversary will be celebrated on 4<sup>th</sup> April in the diocesan level at Balharshah.

# Fr. Antony Munjanattu: Youth Department

Youth programmes like Carrier guidance and PSC coaching will be conducted at Zonal level. Youth seminar will be conducted in parish level. Youth representative leaders training will be conducted. Youth convention will be conducted during the Diwali holidays. Miss Manisha from Wirur Zone suggested to focus on the youth in the parishes.

# Fr. Vincent Pangola, Audio: Visual department.

Many activities are conducted for the faith formation. Daily Bible verses are beig sent through the Whatsapp groups in relation to the *Bible Vachan Varsh*. Sunday Homilies and homilies on Saints life were broadcasted. A Youtube channel is created and the videos of the homilies and the glimpse of the important events of the diocese are being uploaded.

Department has a plan to conduct carol singing competition for the parishes in the month of December. During the advent 25 days Christmas message video will be uploaded in the YouTube channel. Father asked suggestions to celebrate the year of evangelization. some of the suggestions came up as conducting "Pathanattya", upload testimonies and daily bible reflections in the Youtube channels.

### Fr. Jobin Ovelil: LSSS and Kalabhavan

LSSS has different projects in the diocese. Its working for the poor and marginalized. Projects are supported by different funding agencies. Caritas India is supporting two projects known JEEVAN Empowering animation, in Jiwathi block. PLDP project is funded by Miserior. To Solve and to Save project supported by Manos Unidas. IGSS is supporting to run the project Suposhan. CHAI with the support of the Lillian Fond is supporting for the

140 differently abled children. Save A Family Plan India has a project in Rajura block covering 10 villages. Special supports are given by the requests of the parish priests. 40 girls are doing nursing studies. Income generation programmes are given for the poor families. Tailoring centers are supported. Financial support is given for the housing. LSSS is running a Railway CHILDLINE project at Balharshah railway station with the support of the ministry of women and child development.

52 Catholic children are staying and studying at Kalabhavan. Kalabhan focuses on the holistic development of the children. In Post-matric hostel 6 students are there. Last year music course was conducted and 45 children participated. 35 children are taken to Kerala for study tour. Nineteen children acquired Black belt in Karate.

### Fr. Binu Thomas Vocation Promotion and Evangelization.

Vocation promotion is necessary and we must pray for the vocation promotion. Parish priest should cooperate to promote vocations from the parishes.

Fr. Binu told that all the departments are doing Evangelization. Evangelization will be given the priority. Retreats are conducted in many parishes. This ministry need more prayers. Coming year is declared in our diocese as the year of Evangelization. Various programs will be planned as per the requirements.

# EXTRACTS FROM EPARCHIAL STATUTES REGARDING PASSION WEEK CELEBRATION

chanda samachar

- 427. §1. On *Pesaha* (Maundy Thursday), as we commemorate the institution of the Holy Qurbana, it is highly recommended to have Eucharistic adoration, keeping the spirit of Lent. On that day according to the liturgical tradition, Eucharist is not to be exposed in the monstrance but to be adored in the tabernacle, preferably in both species.
  - §2. On *Pesaha* (Maundy Thursday), there shall be only one Holy Qurbana in a parish and if there are more priests, they are to concelebrate. There shall not be Holy Qurbana in the religious houses on that day and all are to participate in the Holy Qurbana in the Parish Church.
  - §3. *Pascha Bhojan/Pascha* meal and such other traditional observances of our families are to be continued. *Pascha Bhojan* in the parish churches or family units is not a substitute to the *Pascha Bhojan* traditionally observed in the family.
- 428. §1. The salvific passion and death of our Lord Jesus Christ is commemorated on Passion Friday and hence all Christian faithful are obliged to attend the liturgical celebrations with devotion and love. There is no Holy Qurbana on that day. The liturgy is to be celebrated as per the liturgical norms.
  - §2. On Passion Friday, the way of the cross is to be conducted in the most solemn way in all the parishes of our Eparchy together with the liturgical services of the day or separately.
  - $\S 3.\ Pilgrimage\ to\ Lakkadakot\ Calvarigiri\ is\ highly\ recommended.$
- 429. There shall be a Holy Qurbana on Holy Saturday. If there are more than one priest, they are to concelebrate on that day.
- 430. Care should be taken not to have dramatic presentations of the paschal mysteries during the Holy Week in the Sanctuary violating its sanctity. (Pastoral Guidance Appendix I)

### 8. PASSION/HOLY WEEK /EASTER CELEBRATION

1. A solemn Palm leaves procession with a wooden cross/any metal cross, but not necessarily crucifix (whenever possible) in the front is

- highly recommended. This procession is to be led by the celebrant. Use the wooden cross to knock at the church door during liturgy.
- 2. Cover decently the Crucifix in the Church before Palm Sunday liturgy. It is left covered until Good Friday service.
- 3. It is highly recommended that all priests, and to the best possible the sisters working in the diocese, participate in the Muron Qurbana (Chrism Mass) which is customarily done on Tuesday of Passion/Holy week.
- 4. The faithful should be properly instructed about their obligation of annual confession and Holy Communion during Passion/Holy week. Every priest in charge should make adequate preparation for the same in every parish.
- 5. The congregation should be properly instructed that the highlight of Holy Thursday is the institution of Priesthood and Holy Eucharist. It is good that people are chosen in advance and prepare them for feet washing ceremony. For instance: a short recollection, a special prayer service with them on 6 Sundays or any other days in a week during Lent, special fasting, abstinence during Lent etc.
- 6. The Holy Thursday Qurbana ends with the final two prayers before the final blessing. As Eucharistic procession takes place and adoration commences immediately after Holy Communion, our tradition is that no final blessing of the Qurbana is given on Maundy Thursday. The Eucharistic procession after which should be done with solemnity, but within the Church. The Eucharist is kept in both species for adoration. Pesaha bread and milk may be shared, if such customs are prevalent in the parish.
- 7. It may be good to conduct all Good Friday liturgies in the morning so that everyone can go for Calvary mount pilgrimage at Lakkadakot.
- 8. Baptismal renewal, blessing of water, fire etc. may be done on Saturday morning along with Qurbana or in the evening as Easter vigil. If it is done on Easter vigil, a simple Qurbana in Saturday morning is greatly desired. Kindly note that there should be fire in the Gamela/Ganj before prayers of blessing is recited over it. Immediately after the blessing that fire is taken into Thurible for incensing.

- 9. A procession with Risen Lord's statue will add solemnity to the Easter celebration.
- 10. Lenten recollections/retreats are highly encouraged.

- 11. Simple/some decoration for Holy Thursday adoration and Easter Sunday Resurrection Liturgy will give a better spiritual experience of the liturgy.
- 12. All celebrations (feasts, B'days) with extravagant solemnity is to be avoided during Great Lent.

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# **Extracts from Eparchial Statutes Regarding Holy Muron**

- 451. In the Old Testament, persons, places and things were sanctified and set apart with the consecration by the Holy Muron. This tradition is followed in the Church for Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Orders, Anointing of the Sick, Consecration of the Church etc.
- 452. Holy Muron, which is made from the oil of olives or other vegetable oils and from aromatics, is confected only by a bishop (c. 693).
- 453. The priests are permitted to bless the oil used for Anointing of the Sick and for Baptism using the Holy Muron blessed by the Bishop. (cf. Pastoral guidelines Appendix I)
- 454. §1. The Bishop consecrates the Holy Muron on Tuesday during Holy Week together with the priests, religious and the lay persons.
  - §2. They have to burn the old Holy Muron and cottons before the new Muron is refilled.
  - §3. An appropriate place is to be allotted in the sanctuary or in the sacristy for preserving the Holy Oil.

### **HOLY OILS**

- **OC** (*Oleum Catechumenorum*) or OS (*Oleum Sanctum*) for Baptism.
- SC (Sanctum Chrisma) for Holy Orders, Confirmation and Church consecration.
- **OI** (*Oleum Infirmorum*) for Anointing the sick.

Prison Ministry India (PMI) is a voluntary organization with its head office in Bangalore. Established in the year 1986, PMI serves 1,401 prisons across India, through its 850 branches.

### VISION

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We shall renew, reform and rehabilitate prisoners through committed volunteers: plan and execute effective measures for crime prevention; build a community with a sensitive and positive attitude to those in prison; facilitate empowerment of prisoners and their families towards social re-integration with dignity.

### **MISSION**

We shall be present in all prisons in India and provide opportunities for prisoners, their families and the authorities to be aware of PMI and avail of our progressive services both within prisons and in the community.

### WHAT WE DO

Our guiding principles of "Renew, and Rehabilitate" have enabled us to reach out to thousands of prisoners and their families, thus transforming lives and building better communities. We give a helping hand and partner with government and prison authorities for the outreach programs mentioned below.

# Inside the prison

 Vocational training and education: Organize joboriented training (tailoring, handicraft, computers, English, literacy), conduct competitions, develop talents and skills, setup equipment to support job-specific training.

- Counselling: Develop coping skills and an attitude of hope for social re-integration.
- Fellowship and inter religious appreciation: Celebrate different festivals like Christmas, Diwali, Raksha Bandhan etc., conduct sessions for spiritual growth and upliftment.
- Health and hygiene: Conduct periodic medical camps to assess and identify skin, dental, eyes and general health issues, talks to highlight the importance of health and hygiene.
- Sports and Recreation: Conduct competitions to develop talents and encourage team spirit, provide entertainment and relief from an otherwise monotonous routine. Tree plantation to promote environment sensitivity.
- Motivational Talks: Conduct inspirational sessions for renewal, reformation and rehabilitation with an aim to prevent re-entry into crime or abuse.
- Legal support: provide legal aid services, attend hearings, facilitate payment of bail

# Outside the prison

- Employment: Provide employment opportunities for prisoners and their families through tie-ups with different organizations agencies.
- Skill training: Provide further training to equip prisoners and their families with skills to enhance financial independence.
- Counselling: Continuous counselling to help deal with social stigmas, to prevent falling back into old/bad habits, to deal with small discouragements and failures.

- Children's education: provide support for the education of the children of prisoners for improved well-being and educational attainment.
- Equipment: Provide / facilitate equipment (handcarts, rickshaws, computers, technical tools etc.) to help released prisoners and their families earn a livelihood and live with dignity.
