Dear and Rev. Fathers,

Greetings and prayerful wishes Bishop's House, Thuckalay!

Since the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic our people have endured testing times with courage, resilience, and compassion. Individuals and communities have made great sacrifices for the protection of health and life. Like many others, the Church has endeavoured to support the people in the face of considerable uncertainty and disruption. I owe a great debt of gratitude to you, dear Fathers, and to the many volunteers whose continued dedication has ensured that our churches have remained very safe places to gather for Mass and the Sacraments. We have also been blessed in the commitment of our school communities who have been supporting our young people in very demanding circumstances, including assisting with their Sunday catechism classes.

Advent and Christmas are likely to be very different this year. Advent, as a time of patient, hopeful waiting and longing, will have a particular resonance in these times, while the much-needed joy of Christmas may well be tempered by the impact of restrictions. I encourage parish communities to explore creatively ways in which the hope of Advent and the joy of Christmas can be realised and safely celebrated.

His Eminence Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger, now Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, writes in his book *Seek That Which is Above*: "Advent is concerned with that very connection between memory and hope which is so necessary to man. Advent's intention is to awaken the most profound and basic emotional memory within us, namely, the memory of the God who became a child. This is a healing memory; it brings hope. The purpose of the Church's year is continually to rehearse her great history of memories, to awaken the heart's memory so that it can discern the star of hope. It is the beautiful task of Advent to awaken in all of us memories of goodness and thus to open doors of hope."

With advent, we begin a new liturgical season and start living and celebrating the mysteries of redemption afresh in the new year. It is a special season, in which we join the fathers and prophets of the Old Testament in waiting for the coming of the promised Messiah. It is a period of fruitful waiting for the Lord. This waiting has a double dimension: it relives the memory of long wait for the first coming of Jesus as an Infant born of the Virgin Mary; it is a hopeful expectation of the glorious return of the Lord to judge the living and the dead.

Waiting is one of the most profound human experiences in life: a couple expecting a child, a student waiting for the results of an examination, someone expecting the arrival of a friend or family member after long separation. In fact, it is hope and expectation that keep humans alive. The moral and spiritual strength of a person is measured in terms of his/her hopes and expectations. In this time of Christmas, we are expecting the incarnation of the Son of God, the saviour of all. Our world is in need of a Saviour and as believers, we await God's coming. It is an invitation to live with a new spirit of hope and expectation for God's intervention in our lives and in human history. Wish you all a fruitful advent season.

Advent tells us that the Emmanuel - God with us – has left his divinity to enter into our humanity to raise us up to a higher place, a higher purpose, to transform our lives, to redirect our lives, to turn us around, plant our feet on higher and solid ground. When we understand the real value of Advent in our lives, we would be led into a much greater understanding and appreciation for Christmas; and when we have a greater understanding and appreciation of these two seasons, we will find ourselves in the place where we can no longer think only of cards and cribs and cakes; but move beyond it to recognizing God in ourselves and especially in the working of God in history and the people.

In our Syro-Malabar tradition, advent is a season of fasting. We fast for twenty-five days to prepare for the nativity of Our Lord. When speaking of fasting, we need to keep in mind that, it is not an external action. It has to come from within, spread to all our actions and raise us to the heavens. Fasting is not a period of sadness; it is a period of enjoyment. It is a period of enjoying heavenly bliss. It is a period for celebrating the Holy *Qurbana* and the Liturgy of the Hours in the most solemn manner possible. It is a time for being with God in His temple. In fasting, more than not eating or drinking or taking part in any bodily entertainments, it is the spiritual entertainments that are more important, namely, the celebration of the liturgies.

If fasting in the Old Testament was a sign of repentance, in the New Testament it is for acquiring the divine qualities and is equal to the heavenly life. Fasting is for purifying the heart. It is for humbling ourselves in the presence of God in the heavenly kingdom. We know the parable of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector (Luke 18: 9-14). The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: "God, I thank you that I am not like other people – robbers, evildoers, adulterers - or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get." But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, "God, have mercy on me, a sinner." We know that the tax collector and not the Pharisee, who went home justified before God.

Let us meaningfully spend the twenty-five days that are at hand in order to prepare for receiving the child Jesus. Whenever we think of Christmas, we are reminded of the nativity scene with the stable, the ox, the donkey, the shepherds, Mary, Joseph and on Christmas the image of the Child Jesus. This is an opportunity to reflect on the mystery of God's love for us that we are celebrating.

Christmas is about a definitive moment in time, in human history, when God showed that He cared for every one of us by entering into our humanity so that He could walk with us, so that He could live with us, so that He could lead us, carry us, lift us to that better place. It is therefore not just about holidays, but rather about the love of our God who wanted to become one with us so deeply, that he gave up his divinity to enter into our wretched humanity. Our greetings, therefore, as they relate to these two seasons should stay clear of a happy holiday syndrome. Our greetings should clearly speak of, and include the real reason for the seasons of Advent and of Christmas - Jesus Christ.

As all of us are aware, Christmas - the birth of God in a poor manger - is the most celebrated feast in this world. Christmas offers us all an opportunity to recapture glimpses of childhood's sacred memories. There is timelessness about gazing into the crib and coming face to face with the truth that God came down from heaven and dwelt among us as a helpless baby. The gospel story tells us that at Bethlehem on a starry night the Son of God was born. A burst of light startled the shepherds, and angels sang at his birth. It is the simplicity of this happening that captures the imagination. Christmas is more than a story that is told; it is about a birth that brings heaven right down to earth. Love came down at Christmas, broke the sacred barrier between creature and Creator and gave an eternal value to our lives. God has given us the gift of reaching beyond ourselves and discovering the joy of heaven.

There was nothing romantic about the first Christmas. Christ's birth was a hard and bitter experience for Joseph and Mary, two poor people with doors slammed in their faces. They were the picture of poverty with neither room nor lodgings; forced to shelter in a stable outside the entry walls, where animals gave up their manger for the child Jesus. The Christ who was to die on Calvary outside of Jerusalem was born outside of Bethlehem. The message is clear from the very beginning that the love of God is available to all, but especially the poor, the weak and the disadvantaged. The stable is an indication of our need to see grace and goodness in the most deprived of people. As we kneel before the crib, we can pray for the vision during this short life of ours to see things God's way and for the courage to act according to his will.

Christmas means something only in so far as we welcome the Lord as he comes to us in the wonder of every human being and as he reveals himself in the value and dignity of every person with whom we live and work. One of the things that makes Christmas very special is being remembered by friends. It is essentially a family feast and an occasion for exchanging gifts and sharing the warmth of our homes in the company of friends. Our hearts and our thoughts are especially with family members who are absent and unable to take part in our festivities. God's presence and love can be experienced in healing misunderstandings, patching up quarrels and letting bygones be bygones. Sometimes removing bitterness can be extremely difficult, but forgiving and forgetting will enable us to enjoy our Christmas happiness to the full.

Christmas is also about kindness, about giving and about the returning of love for love. It is the time of year when our hearts are in the right place and when we realize it is more blessed to give than to receive. We become alive and sensitive to the many needs of the poor who are crying out for our generosity and caring. Spare a thought also for those people who find the going tough and whose lives at this particular time are in the shadow of the crib because of a cross or a recent death. Our joy highlights their sadness. May your Christmas be a holy one because if it is, it will be a happy and joyful one.

I invite you, dear Fathers, to enter into these important moments – the season of advent and the season of Christmas - of our Christian living with greater commitment and devotion so that we can reap rich spiritual benefits not only for ourselves but also the people for whom we have dedicated our lives.

Meeting with Choir Members of the Eparchy: The members of Eparchial choir gathered at Sangamam on 5 November 2020 at 2.30pm. The group discussed about the modalities for the formation of choir groups in our parishes.

Eparchial Day: As you know, every year we celebrate the Eparchial Day on 11 November. This year, the 24th Eparchial Day was celebrated on Sunday, 8 November in our parishes. In order to give opportunities for more people to participate in this event, we organised Holy Qurbana in all our parishes at 3.30pm. The felicitation ceremony and Eparchial Day events were telecasted online from Sangamam at 5.00 pm. During the ceremony, Mr Mariadhas, who received *Preshitha Tharam* award of Syro-Malabar Church, and Ms Sherly Vimal, who secured first rank in the DEO examinations, were felicitated. Blessing of Community Hall at Karode: The St Joseph Parish, Karode is celebrating golden jubilee of its establishment this year. - ➤ Rev. Mother Mercy Nedumpuram SABS, provincial of SABS Changanassery province, made her official visit to all their religious houses in our Eparchy. She met me on 2 November 2020. She also had dinner with the Bishop's House community.

- > Rev. Fr Christudas is appointed parish priest of St Martin De Pores parish, Kazhuvanthittai and he took charge on 12 November 2020.
